(Swanson 1990) There is nothing shown at this location on either the Ordnance Survey 1st Edition (1860 Ayrshire Sheet XLI) or 2nd Edition (1897 Ayrshire Sheet XLI.SW) 6-inch maps. No enclosures are visible on modern aerial photography (GoogleEarth) at this location which is now within a commercial forestry plantation.	Negligible

The rectangular enclosure is very much reduced in comparison with the stell and may be earlier, although at no point can it be seen to underlie the latter. It seems to have been divided into two roughly equal compartments, and was probably nothing more than part of the sheepfold, though it could possibly be the remains of earlier settlement. (Swanson 1990) The Ordnance Survey 1st Edition 6-inch map (1860 Ayrshire Sheet XLI) depicts a circular sheepfold with a radial arm extending to the southeast and two enclosures attached to and extending from the north side of the fold. The fold is also shown on the 2nd Edition 6-inch map (1897 Ayrshire Sheet XLI.SW). The sheepfold is visible on modern aerial photography (GoogleEarth) as a circular enclosure 13 m in diameter with two radial walls; one extending 12 m to the southeast and the other 8 m to the north. Traces of the former enclosures on the north side are also visible.	Low
3	Nether Beoch: Farmstead; Field system; Sheepfold	252420	611770	14201 / 82388	HER; Historic maps; Aerial photography	The HER entry records that on east-facing slopes overlooking Beoch Lane are the remains of enclosures and rig and furrow, some of it within a large late stone-walled enclosure. The area has been disturbed by construction of sheepfolds, and the house site is probably under the cells at the north end of the large enclosure. (Swanson 1990) A farmstead annotated 'Nether Beoch (Ruin)' and comprising one unroofed building and a garden enclosure, one field and a sheepfold are depicted on the Ordnance Survey 1st Edition 6-inch map (Ayrshire 1860, sheet xli). What may be a two compartment unroofed building and one field are shown on the 1989 edition of the Ordnance Survey 1:10,000 map. (RCAHMS (SAH) 2000) The Ordnance Survey 1st Edition 6-inch map (1860 Ayrshire Sheet XLI) shows 'Nether Beoch (ruin)', with one roofless building aligned southwest to northeast at NS 52419 11774, and a possible second immediately to the east. The large enclosure is also shown. 'N. Bioch' is marked on Blaeu's Atlas ('Coila Provincia' 1654). 'Beoch' is also shown on Armstrong's map (1775) at a location that corresponds with the location of 'Nether Beoch', on the eastern edge of a large expanse of bog land. It is also similarly named on Ainslie's map (1821) and on Thomson's map (1832). A documentary reference (New Cumnock History¹) relates that the 'Register of the Great Seal, vol. II, #90 at Edinburgh, 31 May (1427)', describing lands held by Lord Alan Kethkert (Cathcart), lists 'the farthing land of Rewach' (Beoch) amongst the indentured lands. The remains of the farmstead are visible on modern aerial photography (GoogleEarth) as a large standing drystone walled enclosure with a two compartment sheepfold (the location of the former rectangular unroofed building) attached to its northwest corner. The large enclosure has forestry planted within it and there is no trace of the former building visible in the later sheepfold at the northern end of the large enclosure.	Low

It has the appearance of being quarried, particularly in its base, but there is no simple justification for identifying it as man-made. It looks like a sink-hole, although there are no others in the area. It is most probably a natural feature. (Swanson 1990) This area is known as Martyr's Moss because in April 1685, worshippers were surprised by Government troops, and three women and four men were subsequently murdered for being at a 'Field Meeting'. Two of the women were Marion Cameron and Margaret Dunn, the identity of the others is not recorded. The bodies of these women are buried in the area, though the exact location of the bodies is not now known. The Whig Hole is where many meetings were held because of its remoteness. (Smith 2008). 'Whig Hole' is depicted on the Ordnance Survey 1st Edition map (1860 Ayrshire Sheet XLI). A recent research documentary source (Jardine 2017) provides background information, and analysis of historical sources, regarding the various traditional references to both the use of the site as a Covenanter's hiding place and as the site of possible deaths and burial places of Covenanters. Field survey recorded that Whig Hole is a circular hollow at least 20 m in diameter and at least 2 m deep at its centre. There is an exposed bedrock face in the northern arc and a scatter of large angular boulders across the interior, heavily overgrown with mosses and tussock grasses.	Low
